Leadership Tip of the Month

Become a Wordsmith

Most leaders need to become a wordsmith...not really, but you need to seem to be one. Writing articles, letters, or even op-ed articles are common activities for many leaders. Your writing should bring credit to both you and your organization.

The first thing to do is find at least one proofreader. A proofreader looks for errors in your writing. Misspellings, grammar errors, incorrect words, different tenses, and awkward sentences are things a proofreader searches for. One fact you need to remember is that it is very difficult to proofread your own work. Having two proofreaders is even better as it puts more eyes on your writing.

The next person you may need is someone with expertise in the area you're writing in. As an example, I've always sought to have input from someone who knew a great deal about the topic I was writing on. There is nothing wrong with getting input from others and it is easier to put their thoughts into your own words that struggling to be coherent on a topic that you don't know much about.

Having someone who will give you their opinion of what you've written is a benefit to you. Someone who will critique your writing and question what you're trying to say is important.

When you as a leader need to write for someone else, the additional challenge is to channel the writing style of the person you are writing for. Remember that in this situation, your words will be attributed to the person you are helping by writing, so try to write in their style.

As a leader, you need to build a team that allows you to seem to be a wordsmith. Even if you have the skill of a wordsmith, your writing will be better with a team backing you up.

Have Patience

When it comes to membership recruitment, revitalization, or new organizations the most important virtue to have is patience. No one likes high pressure salesmen and while they are often successful, their success can be fleeting. You don't want those who join your organization to develop a case of buyer's remorse later.

Patience is critical for membership recruitment as that potential member is going to decide to join on his or her own time. You can offer encouragement, you can share all the benefits to joining, but ultimately it is the decision of the person to join your organization. If you try to force them to join now, they may feel pressured and refuse.

When you are revitalizing a local unit, it is critical to have patience. If the existing members are open to the idea, you're going to have to find out what they feel is needed and important, and what kind of activities they desire to do to become more attractive to their community. You can't rush those existing members and once you begin, you don't know how long it will take before new blood shows up to be part of the organization.

When organizing a new unit, you never know how quickly you will find those sparkplug types

who will aid you in a successful organization. It is important that you do not rush the project as your goal should be a long-term successful new part of your organization. Patience is critical just as much as follow-up is for every bit of success.

If you develop patience in membership development, you will have learned a great lesson.
